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# Letter from the President & CEO

Dear Friends,

As the 2019 Fall school semester rolled in, we were looking forward to another record-breaking year of fundraising, student academic progress, stable leadership, a growing network of committed partners and increased recognition of our value and impact. We never expected that six months later there would be a global pandemic disrupting life as we knew it. It felt surreal, but there was no time to waste nor to panic. It's not what leaders do.

The Detroit Public Schools Community District (DPSCD) was dealing with a crisis; grappling with how to remain safe, close schools, feed families, deliver curriculum, support educators and deal with the mental health aftermath. There was no play book, no experts and no best practices. We had to figure it out and I have never been more proud to say, we did.

Thanks to DPSCD leadership and a community that cares about our children, the meetings began, the plans were laid, the teams were built, the resources were identified and investment priorities shifted. The pace was grueling but the mission remained unchanged: provide the best care possible for 51,000 children and their families.

2020 has been a year unlike any other.

Although it robbed us of many celebrations and cultural norms, we learned that nothing can steal our commitment to care and provide for the students of DPSCD. Our children were forced to learn some pretty tough life lessons. They learned about racial injustice, our imperfect political process, how to navigate a deadly virus and that tomorrow is not promised; lessons they perhaps were not prepared or ready to learn.

However, what I do know for sure, is that our ability to feel compassion and empathy had been tested. For many of our partners, some old and some new, the inequities of this world brought to light by these

circumstances, moved them to tears. We shared stories of loss, heartache, gratitude and disbelief. Most importantly, we shared how fortunate we were to be in roles that allowed us to lean in, be engaged and console complete strangers through our missions and work.

This was a year we won't forget; the road of challenges and opportunities led to a team of caring, brilliant, innovative and resourceful leaders. The DPS Foundation was humbled to have been in the room when life changing decisions were made. Alongside DPSCD, we responded to families in crisis and those just looking for a stable and consistent public school district offering resources to address their children's education needs.

We have grown. We are bigger. We are better.

I am thankful for our board, Chair Jerome R. Watson and a special thank you to our new Directors. This work requires a strong team and the DPS Foundation family (pictured above) is second to none. You are also a part of our team. Your generous support allows the DPS Foundation to continue bridging and closing gaps so that our students are well and cared for. 2020 lessons learned: be grateful, be compassionate, have empathy, be a resource, show up and do your best. The battle is far from over, but the team I am on, is the right team for these unprecedented times. Please share our annual report and help us grow the team!

## Literacy and Early Childhood Education

Early investment gives children increased opportunities to foster growth in language, literacy, mathematics, science, creative arts, nutrition, social-emotional and healthy physical development.



### Brewer Academy Library Improvements

Justin Abdelkader of the Detroit Red Wings and his wife Julie funded the library upgrade and reading program providing new resources to students, teachers and staff. Brewer is a K-8 school with 520 students. Justin proudly read his children's book "Shoot For The Goal" to students inside the renovated space. He is a native of Muskegon, MI, a Michigan State University Alumnus and author.

### Learning to Learn/Grow Up Great

Since 2009, PNC Foundation's early childhood initiative, Grow Up Great, has benefited thousands of students and families. This year 1,100 students, educators and parents from Bennett Elementary, Catherine C. Blackwell Institute, Burton International Academy, Duke Ellington Conservatory of Music & Art at Beckham Academy, Emerson Elementary-Middle, Maybury Elementary, Priest Elementary-Middle, Schulze Academy for Technology and Arts, Carver STEM Academy, Roberto Clemente Learning Academy, Fisher Magnet Lower Academy, Foreign Language Immersion and Cultural Studies (FLICS) and Golightly Education Center participated in programs offered by Cranbrook Institute of Science, The Henry Ford, Music Hall Center for the Performing Arts and the Detroit Symphony Orchestra.



### Early Learners Intervention Program

The Community Foundation for Southeast Michigan supported a multi-year program starting in 2018 for Detroit's Head Start children, ages 3-5, with special needs. Over 1,800 meetings were conducted and 600+ early learners and their families received intervention programs, ensuring a seamless transition into our kindergarten classrooms.



# STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math)

A well-rounded quality education stimulates curiosity and enables students to make informed decisions that will impact the world and the way in which they live. Students who are motivated and competent in bringing forth solutions learned through opportunities to think creatively have increased success, graduation rates, and employment opportunities.



## Connected Futures

The Connected Futures Initiative addressed the digital divide by providing all 51,000 students with wireless tablets, six months of LTE data/Internet and a year of technical support. Major investors for this \$23M initiative include: DPSCD; the DTE Energy Foundation; Rocket Community Fund; Skillman Foundation; Ralph C. Wilson, Jr. Foundation; General Motors and the W.K. Kellogg Foundation along with 100 others who ensured that our children would have the resources required for virtual learning.

## Launch Learn Code at The Ford Resource and Engagement Center

Funded by Flagstar Foundation and the Junior League of Detroit, the Ford Resource and Engagement Center (FREC) at Fisher Magnet Upper Academy provided 18 young women with the Launch Learn Code program in partnership with the Jerome Bettis Bus Stops Here Foundation. Students were introduced to basic computational languages and technical concepts for building a website, creating App's, and creating their own web page



## Cooke STEM Academy STEM Lab

The Provost-Torgow Fund made possible the new state-of-the art STEM lab for students in Kindergarten through 6th grade. The lab includes high definition technology, engineering resources including STEM Hands-on Kits and Kids Spark, MakerBOT 3D Printers, an engineering curriculum and lab furniture.

## Book Scholarships for Benjamin Carson High School of Science and Medicine (BCHS)

This three-year investment from Michigan Futures Inc. and their partnership with the Berman Foundation, provided support to bridge the gap between the experiences for 15 of our students and the paths they followed in their post-BCHS tomorrow. The program has significantly improved alumni tracking, offering both a glimpse into how BCHS alumni fare in college and where more support is needed.



# Career Pathways

Matching students' skills and interests through career exploration and readiness training is critical when choosing pathways to a high-growth, high-demand occupation. Mentoring, internships, entrepreneur courses and employer partners make for a smooth transition into post-secondary education or the workplace.

## The Workforce Partnership Initiative

Serving over 4,000 students to date, the Initiative aligns curriculum with local, regional and national industry trends to ensure students receive industry-valued skill certificates, student work-based learning opportunities, summer employment, social skills development, dual enrollment programs, scholarships, graduate assistance funds, and integration of core math and English Language Arts content within their chosen pathway. United Way for Southeastern Michigan, the Skillman Foundation and JPMorgan Chase are early investors.



## Microsoft Summer Program

Thanks to a partnership with Microsoft, Grow Detroit's Young Talent, and DPSCD's Office of College and Career Readiness, 11 students from Detroit School of Arts spent their summer working on video production skills, touring local companies, hearing from industry experts, sharpening their interviewing techniques and understanding business finance.

## Cody Rouge Initiative

Ensuring quality schools, enhancing neighborhood conditions, community safety, and increasing employment for families living in the Cody Rouge target area, over five years, supporting over 520 Cody High School students, their families and the Cody Rouge Neighborhood was made possible by the DTE Energy Foundation, General Motors, the Skillman Foundation and Rocket Community Fund.



## Randolph Graduates Assistance Programs

Graduates who pursue skilled trades careers are eligible for assistance during their transition from high school. Whether their path is an apprenticeship program or employment in the skilled trades, these funds assist with work or employment related expenses such as training programs, certifications, clothing, tools, equipment, and transportation. Partners include the Vietnam Veterans of America Chapter 9, Carhartt, and the Home Builders Association of Southeastern Michigan.



## Beyond the Classroom

Providing real world experiences through local and international travel, engaging parents, interactions with business and community leaders, and teacher professional development directly impacts the quality of education of our future leaders.

### PE-Nut Program

The Michigan Fitness Foundation-funded the Physical Education and Nutrition Working Together™ (PE-Nut™) program in 12 schools, using a whole-school approach



### Safe Routes to School

The Michigan Fitness Foundation supported the Safe Routes to School program in 15 schools making it safe, convenient, and fun for children, including those with disabilities, to bike and walk to school.



### New Leaders Program

The Detroit Children's Fund made possible training to teachers and assistant principals to encourage pathways into leadership positions. Over 300 staff participated in Emerging Leaders, Intensive Principal Preparation, Turnaround Leaders, Master Leaders, Aspiring Leaders, New Principals, Aspiring Assistant Principals sessions and Assistant Principal Monthly Meetings.



### National Day of Racial Healing

Created and piloted in 2017 by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation (WKKF) the day after the MLK Day holiday, partners included the Jewish Fund Teen Board and Wayne State University. The Day addresses racial equity, prejudice, social justice and societal pressures facing our young middle-school aged students. [Participating schools included: DPSCD's Paul Robeson Malcolm X Academy, Academy of the Americas and Davison Elementary-Middle, Farber Hebrew Day School, Hillel Day School and Franklin Middle School from the Wayne Westland District and Beer Middle School within the Warren Consolidated School District. Over 320 7th and 8th grade students and 100 adults engaged in important conversations around being different and racial healing, all for a more just and equitable society and world.]



### Ford Resource & Engagement Center (FREC) at Fisher Magnet Upper Academy

This 10,000 square foot center inside Fisher Upper is focused on basic needs, economic growth, and quality of life for this under-resourced east side community. Access to no-cost programs and services has been made available to families since October 2017 thanks to the Ford Motor Company Fund. One signature event, FREC City Saturdays, are fun days created to engage students, families, and the surrounding community through thoughtful programming while providing access to basic needs.

### DPSCD Professional Development Day

Supported by General Motors and several other funders, over 4,000 educators, from all 110 schools, converged into the TCF Center to participate in a day-long professional development event to hear key messages of support, appreciation, and encouragement from Superintendent Dr. Nikolai Vitti. Educators received instruction on content area resources for expanding their teaching styles and current trends in student-based learning methods and theories. Renowned professor and author, Dr. Jeff Duncan-Andrade, shared effective pedagogical strategies.



### Basic Needs

The well-being of the whole child goes beyond academic achievement tools dispensed in the classroom. Families often need resources to make ends meet, to handle unexpected circumstances, and properly manage the day-to-day responsibilities of caring for children. Through the support of the FCA US LLC, The Children's Foundation, and other individual donors, students and families received uniforms and gift cards for items such as food, healthcare, hygiene products, burial services and transportation.



### ModEL Schools Program

The ModEL Schools Program, in conjunction with EL Education, funded by the Detroit Children's Fund, focuses on building instructional leadership capacity, elevating teacher practices in standards-aligned instruction and expanding coherence across the District. The program included 16 Model Schools receiving K-8 English Language Arts coaching and expanded its program to include 4 Model High Schools.





## The School at Marygrove

Supported by The Kresge Foundation and Detroit Children's Fund, the School at Marygrove combines a learning experience based on Social Justice and Leadership through Engineering requiring experienced critical thinkers who can solve complex problems. The inaugural class included 100 9th graders. Seven (7) educators participated and received over 20-hours of professional development, instruction and project-based learning, designed for educating urban students in social justice techniques for grades 9-12. Additionally, Marygrove P-20 received project management services.

## Parent Engagement/Parent Academy

This three-pronged parent engagement approach, funded by the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, includes Parent Academy workshops and training, Parent-Teacher Home Visits and a Kindergarten Bootcamp. Parent Academy offered over 600 virtual and face-to-face courses and serviced over 5,600 parents and caregivers. Popular Workshops Sessions included: Painting with a Purpose, Understanding the Law, Raising Awareness about Human Trafficking, Bullying and Suicide Prevention, Detroit Land Bank-Home Ownership, Math Night, Iron Chef, Family Fun & Fitness, College Readiness, and Parent Leadership Series. Parent-Teacher Home Visits focused on the whole child, including a stable and positive home life to ensure academic achievement. This year 5,567 visits were conducted by hundreds of trained educators across 45 schools. Kindergarten Boot Camp provided 196 children and caregivers with a pre-kindergarten six-week summer virtual course with incentives, field trips and school supplies.



## AmeriCorps Attendance Program

Funded by the Skillman Foundation and United Way of Southeastern Michigan, the AmeriCorps Attendance Coaches Program focused on improving the overall student attendance behaviors of 100+ students by fostering a school-going culture that dramatically reduces chronic absenteeism. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, members partnered with schools and the Office of Homeless and Foster Care Services to conduct over 600 student wellness checks.

2020 DETROIT COLLEGE PROMISE (DCP) SCHOLARS

The Detroit College Promise (DCP) was founded by former DPS Foundation Board Member, Dr. Nat Pernick, in honor of his parents who were alumni of Detroit Public Schools. In spite of COVID-19 restrictions and challenges, 36 DCP Class of 2020 scholars pressed ahead and persevered, earning \$39,000 in scholarship funds supporting higher education at Tier-One colleges and universities.

Under the DCP umbrella, the DPS Foundation currently manages the following scholarships: Detroit Chapter 9 of Vietnam Veterans of America, Inc., the Bess and Henry Krolik, the George Curby Newman Memorial Scholarship for athletes, the Willie McAllister Jr., Fine Arts and Education and the Dr. Deborah Johnson Spence Scholarship for young women. Applicants meeting the minimum requirements of attending a DPSCD High School for the duration, and an overall 2.5 grade point average, are encouraged to apply. Awards may be used towards tuition, books, housing, meal plans or technology essentials. The DPS Foundation also manages fiduciary responsibilities of the Roy and Maureen Roberts renewable scholarship, where the funds are available for tuition, fees, books and housing.

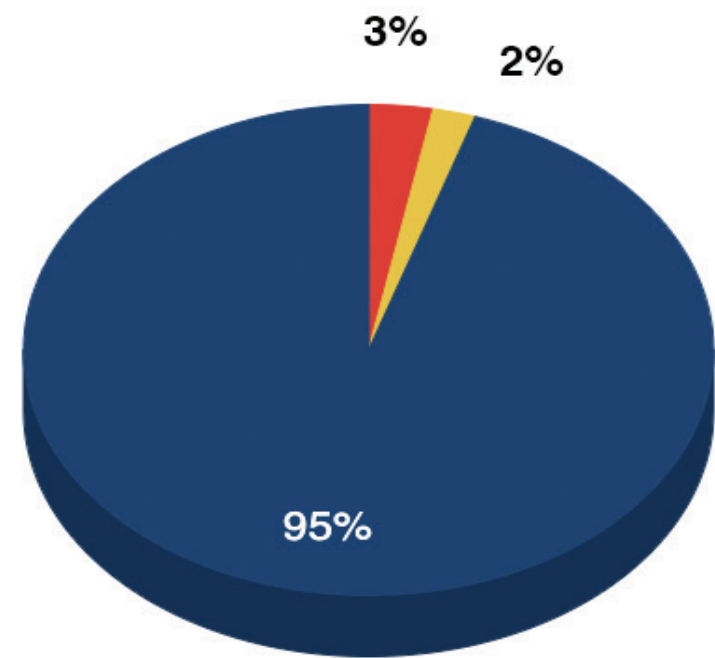
